Preface

This book is a compilation of essays, for the most part reprinted from *Marxism Today*, some as they first appeared, others adapted to varying degrees.

Two of these essays appeared in 1985: Göran Therborn, 'The Two-Thirds, One-Third Society' (June) which is based on an extract from *Why Some People Are More Unemployed Than Others* (Verso 1985), and Robin Murray, 'Benetton Britain' (November). Frank Mort, 'The Politics of Consumption' was substantially revised from an article written with Nicholas Green (May 1988). Tom Nairn, 'Tartan Power' (June 1988) is a revised version of an address made at the launch of The Campaign for a Welsh Assembly (November 1988). David Marquand, 'Beyond Left and Right: The Need for a New Politics' appeared in July 1988.

All other essays from Marxism Today were first published between October 1988 with the 'launch' of the New Times project and September 1989. From the 'New Times' issue in October 1988 we have included: Rosalind Brunt, 'The Politics of Identity'; Stuart Hall, 'The Meaning of New Times'; Charlie Leadbeater, 'Power to the Person'; Robin Murray, 'Fordism and Post-Fordism'; and John Urry, 'The End of Organised Capitalism'. Other essays published since are: David Held, 'The Decline of the Nation State' and Geoff Mulgan, 'The Power of the Weak' (December 1988); Dick Hebdige, 'After the Masses' (January 1989); Göran Therborn, 'Vorsprung Durch Rethink' (February 1989); Sarah Benton, 'The Decline of the Party', Geoff Mulgan, 'The Changing Shape of the City' and Fred Steward, 'Green Times' (March 1989); Neal Ascherson, 'Eastern Europe on the Move', Martin Jacques, 'Britain and Europe', David Marquand, 'The Irresistible Tide of Europeanisation' and Gwyn A Williams, 'The Onward March of the Small Nation' (April 1989); Charlie Leadbeater, 'Thatcherism and Progress' Stuart Hall and David Held, 'Citizens and Citizenship' (June 1989); Gareth Stedman Jones, 'The Crisis of Communism' (July 1989); David Edgar, 'Novel Approaches: A Tale for New Times' (August 1989); Geoff Mulgan, 'Uncertainty, Reversibility and Variety' (September 1989).

There are three pieces which are reprinted from other publications: Beatrix Campbell, 'New Times Towns', based on her series 'Campbell's Kingdom' which first appeared in The Guardian (August and September 1989); Paul Hirst, 'After Henry' based on the piece of the same title which appeared in New Statesman and Society (21 July 1989); Michael Rustin, 'The Trouble with New Times' based on 'The Politics of Post-Fordism' which appeared in New Left Review, 175 (June/July). There are also three extracts here from The Manifesto for New Times, published in June 1989: 'The New Times', 'Paths to Renewal' and 'Realignment of Politics'. The Manifesto was written by Beatrix Campbell, Marian Darke, Tricia Davis, David Green, Joanna de Groot, Ron Halverson, Steve Hart, Martin Jacques, Charlie Leadbeater, Bert Pearce, Jeff Rodrigues, Mhairi Stewart and Nina Temple, and was subsequently amended by the Communist Party executive committee.
